Jaume Munar | Age: 27 | World No. 65 | Career-High No. 52 | 2024: 12-17 (2 times in QF) | Kitzbuhel: 4-3 (2018 SF)
> Former World No. 3 junior advanced to 2018 Next Gen ATP Finals SF and achieved career-high No. 52 in May 2019.

> Finished 2022 at year-end high No. 58 after earning personal-best 19 wins and qualifying for 4 ATP Masters 1000 events.

> Defeated countryman Alcaraz before falling to countryman Carreno Busta in 1st ATP Tour final at 2021 Marbella.

> Earned 2 Top-10 wins over No. 3 Zverev at 2019 Marrakech 2R and No. 3 Ruud at 2022 Tokyo 1R.

> Owns 132-69 Challenger record (9-7 in finals), including at least one title for seven years in a row (2017-23).

> Reached 2014 Roland Garros boys' singles final and won boys' doubles title in 2015 with countryman Lopez San Martin.

NOTE: Munar beat Hanfmann in 2018 Kitzbuhel 1R on the way to 1st of his 4 ATP Tour SFs. He is 9-3 in opening-round matches on clay this year (8-3 on tour-level), losing to eventual champion Fils in Hamburg 1R last week.

Yannick Hanfmann | Age: 32 | World No. 116 | Career-High No. 45 | 2024: 12-19 (Cordoba QF) | Kitzbuhel: 7-5 (2020 Final)
> Hearing-impaired player broke into Top 100 in 2018 and achieved career-high No. 45 in July 2023.

> Earned biggest win of career over No. 5 Tsitsipas at 2023 Mallorca en route to 6th ATP Tour SF.

> Defeated No. 9 Fritz in 2R and No. 6 Rublev in 4R to reach 1st ATP Masters 1000 QF at 2023 Rome.

> Qualified en route to 1st ATP Tour final at 2017 Gstaad and 2nd final at 2020 Kitzbuhel.

> Captured 1st Top 10 win of career over No. 9 Monfils at 2020 Hamburg, where he accepted main draw WC instead of playing qualifying at Roland Garros.

> Posted 1st Grand Slam main draw win in 7th try at 2022 Australian Open as Q (d. Kokkinakis).

> Captured 6 Challenger titles after playing for University of Southern California (2012-15), where he helped Trojans win 2 NCAA national titles.

NOTE: Hanfmann is one of four former Kitzbuhel finalists in the draw (Baez, Martinez, Thiem). He made both ATP Tour finals on altitude clay at 2017 Gstaad (l. to Fognini) and 2020 Kitzbuhel (l. to Kecmanovic)

Thiago Seyboth Wild (BRA) vs [WC] Joel Schwaerzler (AUT) First Meeting

Thiago Seyboth Wild | Age: 24 | World No. 72 | Career-High No. 58 | 2024: 14-18 (Rio QF) | Kitzbuhel: 1-2 (2023 2R)
> Former Top-10 junior achieved career-high No. 58 in May 2024 after posting runs to 3R in ATP Masters 1000 events in Indian Wells, Miami and Madrid during the season.

> Captured 2020 Santiago title as 19-year-old WC (d. Ruud), becoming 1st ATP Tour champion born in 2000s and youngest Brazilian champion in Open Era.

> Upset World No. 2 Medvedev for biggest win of career and 1st Grand Slam win in his Roland Garros main draw debut as Q in 2023.

> One week before Santiago, saved 3 MPs to beat Davidovich Fokina in 2020 Rio de Janeiro 1R as WC – longest ATP Tour match at 3:50 since 2009 Madrid SF (Nadal d. Djokovic in 4:03).

> Also earned 1st ATP Tour win of career on home clay, defeating E. Ymer in 2019 Sao Paulo 1R as WC, then reached 2nd ATP Tour QF at 2024 Rio de Janeiro.

> Ended junior career by beating fellow #NextGenATP player Musetti for 2018 US Open boys' singles title.

NOTE: Seyboth Wild is 10-6 in opening rounds on tour-level this year after 0-4 start. He won 7 of his last 8 matches against players ranked outside Top 100, losing to No. 311 Kuhn via RET in Braunschweig Challenger 1R this month.

Joel Schwaerzler | Age: 18 | World No. 392 | Career-High No. 387 | 2024: 0-0 (Debut) | Kitzbuhel: 0-0 (2023 Q1)
> Earned first ATP point at age 17 in March 2023 before breaking the Top 500 in May 2024 at a career-high No. 387.

> Peaked at No. 1 in the juniors in January 2024 having won the 2023 ITF World Tennis Tour Junior Finals. Later claimed the trophy at 2024 Roland Garros in boys' doubles w/Budkov Kjaer.

> Won maiden Challenger title at 2024 Skopje ranked No. 664 at the age of 18 in just 7th Challenger main draw appearance. He defeated former Top 100 player Majchrzak in the final.

- > Made ATP Tour qualifying debut in Kitzbuhel in 2023 before making his ATP Tour main draw debut at the same event in 2024.
- > Mentored by Jurgen Melzer, former Top 10 player in singles and doubles.

NOTE: Schwaerzler is making his ATP Tour main draw debut after losing to D. Novak in Kitzbuhel Q1 in 2023. The 18-year-old is facing a Top 100 opponent for the 2nd time in his career (l. to No. 97 Ramos-Vinolas in 2023 Bad Waltersdorf Challenger 1R). His coach, J. Melzer, was the runner-up at this event in 2008.

[8] Laslo Djere (SRB) vs [Q] Vit Kopriva (CZE)

First Meeting

- Laslo Djere** | Age: 29 | World No. 57 | Career-High No. 27 | 2024: 4-12 (5 times in 2R) | Kitzbuhel: 7-4 ('20, '23 SF)
- > Former World No. 3 junior broke into Top 30 after winning 1st ATP Tour title at 2019 Rio de Janeiro without dropping a set, reaching career-high No. 27 in June 2019.
 - > Dedicated Rio title to his parents, Caba and Hajnalka, who both passed away from cancer.
 - > Defeated countryman Lajovic en route to 2nd title at 2020 Sardinia.
 - > Earned 5 victories and won 5 TBs en route to 2022 Winston-Salem final despite entering event with 15-44 career record on hard courts and 1-18 TB record in 2022.
 - > Also on hard courts, upset World No. 3 Ruud at 2023 Auckland for biggest win of career.

NOTE: Djere is defending 300 points for making the 2023 Hamburg final. Kitzbuhel is one of four ATP Tour events he has made multiple semifinals at alongside 2017, 2019 Budapest, 2018, 2021 Gstaad, and 2021, 2023 Hamburg.

- Vit Kopriva** | Age: 27 | World No. 113 | Career-High No. 111 | 2024: 1-6 (Davis Cup) | Kitzbuhel: 0-1 (2022 1R)
- > Earned 1st ranking point at age 18 in 2015, broke into Top 500 in 2016, Top 200 in 2021 and earned career-high No. 111 in September 2023 after going on a 12-2 run in Challengers that month.
 - > Advanced to 2021 Gstaad SF as 249th-ranked Q, joining 2021 Cordoba champion J. Cerundolo as 2nd player since May 2012 to reach SF in his ATP Tour main draw debut.
 - > Defeated No. 10 Shapovalov in 2021 Gstaad 2R to become lowest-ranked player to earn Top-10 win since No. 698 Kokkinakis beat No. 6 Raonic at 2017 London/Queen's Club.
 - > Owns 107-87 Challenger record (3-1 in finals), capturing titles at 2022 Prostejov, 2023 Verona and 2023 Tulln.
 - > Former Top-75 junior earned boys' singles wins over future Top-15 ATP players de Minaur and Ruud.

NOTE: Kopriva seeks his 1st ATP Tour clay-court win since 2022 Marrakech (d. Zapata Miralles in 1R). He is 2-10 vs. Top 100 opponents on tour-level, picking up both wins at 2021 Gstaad (No. 10 Shapovalov and No. 96 M. Ymer).
